Looking at your reading list here, in addition to the Scheer book, all of these books are pretty far left that you have on there, your reading curriculum, would you not agree?

A: Uh, I would disagree.

A: The first half of this class is about how to explain individual countries' foreign policies,

A: This is not the focus of the class.

O: Ok, obviously it isn't, because you've got Scheer...

A: It's not a normative class. It's not...

A: about values.

O: Let me define it...

Scheer's book is a hate-Bush diatribe.

far left guy. Would I...am I wrong in describing you that way?

A: Uh, that's not...relevant to this issue.

A: Well...

O: You shape the class.

A: What's the class about?

O: The class is about, it seems to me, America is bad.

A: No, the class is about: why do countries do what they do, and how do national leaders attempt to *avoid* having their behavior explained, and...

A: how they avoid...

O: a book called *The Five Biggest Lies Bush Told Us About Iraq...?*

A: Sure, which is a...

O: Come on!

A: which is a *fabulous* item pedagogically in getting students to understand the strategies that governments use to slip out from under...

A: to slip out from under a prescription...

O: I wouldn't mind that...

A: for change, for transformation.

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O: If I were in your class, I wouldn't mind reading that book, but I'd like to read why...another book that balances it out.

O: But it's all one way...

A: to increase public support.

O: you're feeding these kids, 35 undergrads, and

You're feeding these guys a one world view. And, you know, it's not right. You ought to have...

A: One world?

O: Yeah.

A: You mean, Wendell Wilkie?

O: No, the one world is: Capitalism is bad; Bush is a liar. America is bad.

Scheer is...uh, wuh...Scheer is...

A: That's not the point.

O: Scheer...

A: That's not the point of the class!

O: Scheer doesn't have any credibility. Why would you use a book, if you're an academic, and you have been for 31 years...

A: Uh huh.

O: Why would you use a book by a guy who's been *fired* by the *L.A. Times* for being irresponsible *in his opinions?*

Why would you use a book like that?

A: Because I'm not using it as an...as an embodiment of his opinions.

O: It's required reading!

A: No, but what is it designed to do in the classroom, which you don't have any sense of!?

O: Oh...

A: It's not designed...it's not designed to convince people of a different opinion they might have about...

O: Alright.

A: about the war in Iraq.

O: Your opinion and Scheer's are the same...

A: It's designed to help them *think it through*.
